Report to Executive Director of Children's Services for a final decision on a proposal to change the catchment areas of Hopton CE Primary Academy, Homefield CE VA Primary School, Hillside Primary School, Woodlands Primary Academy and Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy, and from 1 September 2024.

The Proposals

Norfolk County Council, Creative Education Trust and the Trustees of Woodlands Primary Academy, the Diocese of Norwich Education and Academies Trust (DNEAT) and the Governors of Hopton CE Primary Academy, Ormiston Academies Trust and the Governors of Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy consulted on a proposal to change the catchment areas of 5 schools, Hopton CE Primary Academy, Homefield CE VC Primary School, Hillside Primary School, Woodlands Primary Academy and Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy and effective from 1 September 2024.

Hopton CE Primary Academy and Ormiston Cliff Park_Primary Academy ran their own separate Citizenspace consultations Homefield CE VC Primary School, Hillside Primary School and Woodlands Primary Academy share a combined catchment in Bradwell, referred to as 'shared catchment'. The Citizenspace survey combined all three into one online consultation.

This report considers all five consultations undertaken by Norfolk County Council in conjunction with Creative Education Trust and the Trustees of Woodlands Primary Academy, the Diocese of Norwich Education and Academies Trust (DNEAT) and the Governors of Hopton CE Primary Academy, Ormiston Academies Trust and the Governors of Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy.

Our proposal was initiated in response to significant growth of new houses planned in the local area of Hopton and the ability to meet demand. Norfolk County Council is proposing to change the catchment areas, before the housing is in place and occupied, to ensure that the catchments better reflect the current and future pupil population and demand for school places. The changes aim to:

- Reduce the need for pupils to travel long distances to school, aligning with Norfolk's School Travel Vision, enabling pupils to safely walk and cycle to school.
- Align the catchment areas with the feeder patterns of the schools.
- Ensure that there is sufficient capacity and choice for pupils living in the areas where new housing developments are planned or underway.

The changes are proposed to come into effect from 1 September 2024 for the 2025/2026 admissions, without affecting current students. The catchment changes are not anticipated to alter admission priorities or affect secondary school admissions.

Overview

An overview of how each school will be affected by the proposed changes (full consultation documents for each school can be located in Appendix A1 to A5).

Hopton CE Primary Academy: The proposal for Hopton EC Primary Academy is to reduce its catchment area in order to serve the local village community leading to better connectivity, reallocating the northern end to Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy and the eastern section to Homefield CE VC Primary. Despite the reduction, stable pupil forecasts with local growth will meet existing building capacity. This change will continue to allow for parental preference and widerarea admissions as required.

Bradwell; Homefield CE VC Primary School, Hillside Primary School and Woodlands Primary Academy (shared catchment): These three schools have a combined catchment area. The proposal is to increase the size of the shared catchment by extending west into some of the existing Hopton catchment area. Norfolk County Council is aware additional housing will come forward as part of the Great Yarmouth Borough Council Local Plan and the resulting additional pupils will be accommodated as part of the proposal to relocate and expand Homefield CE VC Primary to its new site. The proposed relocation of Homefield school to a new school building located on Chaplin Road will not be affected by this change of catchment area.

Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy: The catchment area for Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy will be increased by incorporating north east section of Hopton's current catchment area. This change is expected to allow the school to admit children from a wider area based on better connectivity to walking and cycling routes linked with new development.

The Consultations

The five consultations ran simultaneously from 15 April 2024 to 24 May 2024 for six weeks. Each setting consulted with their relevant stakeholders. Copies of all five consultation documents are available in Appendix A1 to A5. The documents were shared by email, school websites and available as hard copies. Online consultations were also carried out.

Over the five consultations, a total of 2258 consultation documents were sent to;

- The governors and staff at all five schools
- Schools in the school cluster groups
- Diocesan Boards of Education
- Trade Unions who represent staff at the schools
- Local Members of Parliament

One person attended.

- Concerns over the timing of the consultation being at 3:30pm when it was felt many working parents may not be able to attend or have the opportunity to represent their views.
- What could the potential impact be on admissions if a family have a child in Homefield, a child in Hillside but may live further away than the new school. Could they third child get a school place in an alternative school based on distance?
- Have decisions been made about what the existing school may be used for once the new site has been occupied?
- Whether the actual travel distance to the new school would be more ecologically and environmentally more efficient that the schools current position?
- Parent raised a query about sustainability statement within consultation document relating to Hopton Primary.

Summary Analysis

The full analysis is available in Appendix B1 to B3.

Overall, there were 12 responses to the consultations. The response rate is low at 0.5%.

- 7 people strongly agreed or agreed (0.3%)
- 1 Person neither agreed or disagreed (0.04%)
- 4 people strongly disagreed or disagreed with the proposal (0.2%).

Conclusion

Norfolk County Council has a duty to ensure sufficient school places. This is achieved through the School's Sufficiency Plan for pupil place provision 4 – 16 years. This Plan was agreed by Norfolk County Council's Cabinet on 10 January 2024.

There is significant growth of new houses planned in the Hopton and Bradwell local area. Reducing the size of the catchment for Hopton that relates to the capacity of the existing school recognises the constraints of the school site, and will allow additional housing to the northern part of the catchment to be accommodated by Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy. The new housing is in close proximity to the school and will make use of already established safe walking and cycling routes. The change to the north western section of the catchment allows for future housing to be better aligned to the proposed relocation and expansion of the Homefield school to a new school building which will be positioned to the southern edge of the existing combined Bradwell catchment. Longer term this will support more capacity if growth is recognised, and to account for better sustainable routes to school.

The catchment adjustments will ensure that there is sufficient capacity and choice for pupils living in the areas where new housing developments are planned or underway. This will reduce the need for pupils to travel longer distances to school, aligning the catchment areas with the present feeder patterns to each of the schools.

Response rates to the consultation were low at 0.5%. The main areas of concern raised during the consultation relate traffic and travel concerns to the schools and practical challenges to families where siblings attend multiple settings in the area.

The proposals are not anticipated to affect current pupils attending the five schools or the admission to secondary phase school placements in the area. Changes would be effective for admissions into reception for the school year 2025/26.

Recommendation

The Executive Director of Children's Services **agrees** that from 1 September 2024, the catchment changes for Homefield CE VA Primary School, Hillside Primary School, Woodlands Primary Academy, Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy and Hopton CE Primary Academy come into effect. This is due to the significant growth of new houses planned in the local area, ensuring the catchments will better reflect the current and future pupil population and demand for places before the houses are built and occupied.

Consultation on a change of catchment area for Homefield CE VC Primary School, Norfolk, from 1 September 2024

Our proposal

Norfolk County Council is proposing to change the catchment area of Homefield CE VC Primary School, from 1 September 2024.

Why are we consulting on a change of catchment area?

There is significant growth of new houses planned in the local area. Norfolk County Council are proposing to change the catchment areas, before the housing is in place and occupied, so that we can ensure local children are in catchment for a school within their community.

For example, there are 500 homes planned for the northern part of the current Hopton catchment area. The current school in Hopton is based in the centre of the village and is therefore accessible for local children living in Hopton, to walk or cycle to school. Norfolk County Council have assessed that children living in the new homes in the northern part of the current Hopton catchment area would have better access to Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy via established footpaths and road infrastructure. If the Hopton catchment area remains as it is, it would mean these children would have to travel along the A47 to get to their school in catchment. The remaining catchment area to the west of Hopton, would have better access to schools in Bradwell.

This proposal is linked to a proposal from Norfolk County Council, to change the catchment areas of Hopton CE Primary Academy and Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy from 1 September 2024. What is a catchment area

A catchment area is a defined geographical area that serves a particular school. In most cases, the area is used to provide priority for admission to a particular school. In planning the layout of a catchment area, the Admissions Authority, in this case Norfolk County Council, should try to ensure that the parent would have reasonable expectation for priority to that school. A catchment area can be used to determine the priority for a place at the school but does not prevent a family applying for a place there. The catchment area in the case of Homefield CE VC Primary School is a combined catchment which is shared by all three schools serving the local community in the Bradwell area.

What are the proposed changes to the catchment area

The proposal is to increase the size of the combined Bradwell catchment shared by Homefield CE VC Primary School, by extending into some of the western side of the existing Hopton catchment area, to ensure that local children have more sustainable travel routes to their local school. This proposal does not impact on the children currently attending Homefield CE VC Primary School, but if agreed will come into effect from September 2024 for the admissions to Reception for the school year 2025/26.

The forecast information for Homefield CE VC Primary Schools shows a level of stability into the future, we are aware additional housing will come forward as part of the Great Yarmouth Borough Council Local Plan and this will be accommodated as part of the proposal to relocate and expand the school to its new site. This will give increased


capacity to the area and meet the need of the existing and extended catchment area. The changes to catchment will not change the admission priority for parental preference, or from pupils being admitted from across the wider area.


The proposed relocation of Homefield school to a new school building located on Chaplin Road will not be affected by this change of catchment area.

Consultation on a change of catchment area for Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy, Norfolk, from 1 September 2024

Our proposal

Norfolk County Council, Ormiston Academies Trust and the Trustees of Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy are proposing to change the catchment area of Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy, from 1 September 2024.

Why are we consulting on a change of catchment area?

There is significant growth of new houses planned in the local area. Norfolk County Council are proposing to change the catchment areas, before the housing is in place and occupied, so that we can ensure local children are in catchment for a school within their community.

For example, there are 500 homes planned for the northern part of the current Hopton catchment area. The current school in Hopton is based in the centre of the village and is therefore accessible for local children living in Hopton, to walk or cycle to school. Norfolk County Council have assessed that children living in the new homes in the northern part of the current Hopton catchment area would have better access to Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy via established footpaths and road infrastructure. If the Hopton catchment area remains as it is, it would mean these children would have to travel along the walking/cycling route situated alongside the A47 or drive to get to their school in catchment.

This proposal is linked to a proposal from Norfolk County Council, to change the catchment areas of Hopton and Bradwell from 1 September 2024. What is a catchment area

A catchment area is a defined geographical area that serves a particular school. In most cases, the area is used to provide priority for admission to a particular school. In planning the layout of a catchment area, the Admissions Authority, in this case Ormiston Academies Trust, should try to ensure that the parent would have reasonable expectation for priority to that school. A catchment area can be used to determine the priority for a place at the school but does not prevent a family applying for a place there.

What are the proposed changes to the catchment area


The proposal is to increase the size of Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy catchment area, by taking some of the current Hopton catchment area, to ensure that local children have more sustainable travel routes to their local school. This proposal does not impact on children currently attending Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy, but if agreed will come into effect from September 2024 for the admissions to Reception for the school year 2025/26.


The pupil forecasts remain quite stable into the future and sit slightly under the existing capacity of the school. This will give some capacity for the school to continue to admit children based on parental preference from a wider area.

The Local Authority does not think this change in catchment impacts the secondary phase schools across the area. Admissions criteria is set by each Admissions Authority and local academies currently do not consider catchment as a key criteria as part of the admission process.

Consultation a change of catchment area for Hopton CE Primary Academy, Norfolk, from 1 September 2024

Our proposal

Norfolk County Council, Diocese of Norwich Education and Academies Trust (DNEAT) and the Governors of Hopton CE Primary Academy are proposing to change the catchment area of Hopton CE Primary Academy, from 1 September 2024.

Why are we consulting on a change of catchment area?

There is significant growth of new houses planned in the local area. Norfolk County Council are proposing to change the catchment areas, before the housing is in place and occupied, so that we can ensure local children are in catchment for a school within their community.

For example, there are 500 homes planned for the northern part of the current Hopton catchment area. The current school in Hopton is based in the centre of the village and is therefore accessible for local children living in Hopton, to walk or cycle to school. Norfolk County Council have assessed that children living in the new homes in the northern part of the current Hopton catchment area would have better access to Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy via established footpaths and road infrastructure. If the Hopton catchment area remains as it is, it would mean these children would have to travel along the A47 to get to their school in catchment.

This proposal is linked to a proposal from Norfolk County Council, to change the catchment areas of Ormiston Cliff Park and Bradwell from 1 September 2024. What is a catchment area

A catchment area is a defined geographical area that serves a particular school. In most cases, the area is used to provide priority for admission to a particular school. In planning the layout of a catchment area, the Admissions Authority, in this case DNEAT, should try to ensure that the parent would have reasonable expectation for priority to that school.

What are the proposed changes to the catchment area

The proposal is to reduce the size of Hopton catchment area, to ensure that local children have easier travel routes to their local school. It is proposed that the 'lost area' to the northern end of the current catchment area will be included in the Ormiston Cliff Park Primary Academy catchment area. The section to the right, will go to Bradwell catchment area.

The pupil forecasts remain quite stable into the future and sit slightly under the existing capacity of the school. This will give some capacity for the school to continue to admit children based on parental preference from a wider area. This incorporates locations across Gorleston as well as those that come from Suffolk.

The vast majority of the existing pupil population stems from the village of Hopton, with additional housing anticipated within this area, and wider sites which may come forward as part of future local plan allocation will enable local places for children living in this community as those houses are built out.


The Local Authority does not think this change in catchment impacts the secondary phase schools across the area. Admissions criteria is set by each Admissions Authority and local academies currently do not consider catchment as a key criteria as part of the admission process.

Response to the consultation by Bradwell Parish Councillor

(All Schools)

The 3 schools in Bradwell are struggling to accommodate the children in the immediate vicinity, To bring children into the 3 schools mentioned from Hopton or Gorleston to Bradwell is the most rediculas idea and I would like to talk to the person who thought it up.

The nearest schools should be Peterhouse or Herman which would be closer.

Two major roads have to be crossed if children from Gorleston or Hopton have to walk to school to Bradwell, they are Lowestoft Road and Beccles Road, as not every parent has a car and no busses run that way near to the 3 Bradwell Schools.

A parent from Hillside has been told her 3rd child must go to Moorlands in Belton and her other two to stay at Hillside.
